


My own dictionary is a tossed salad of instant coffee and tobacco crumbs and India Paper. My dictionary, it is a dear <u>leviathan</u>.

I mean that this book is heavy and pregnant and makes you think.






As a child, I would have never gone through unabridged dictionaries if I hadn't suspected there were dirty words in there.

conjunction meaning as (as, Do like I do)


MERRIAM-WEBSTER 2ND EDITION

Here is the rundown on AIN'T


